PEACE BE WITH YOU

I think it is interesting that when the resurrected Jesus first appeared to all the disciples as they were huddling together in fear behind closed doors, the first thing he said to them was, "Peace be with you" (John 20:19). Why peace? I think maybe I would have preferred something a little more useful, like maybe great success in life or knowledge of the universe or the ability to predict the stock market or assurance of a long, healthy life. But peace? Now to be sure, we could certainly use a little more peace around the world, with all the violence we see on the news every day. Heck, we could even use a lot more peace in the church, with all the infighting and separation. Never mind Washington, D.C. But surely Jesus died and rose from the dead to do more than simply satisfy Rodney King's request, "Can't we all just get along?"

So what is this peace that Jesus offers us? Certainly, it's not peace as the world understands it: "As long as I have everything I want, as long as I am happy, I will leave you alone. You can do your thing, and I will do mine. We'll live in 'peace'." That's not the kind of peace Jesus came to give us. As he told his disciples just a few days earlier, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives" (John 14:27). That's because the peace that Jesus brings is based on something much more than just a temporary level of satisfaction resulting from having all my needs and desires fulfilled. It's a peace that was bought with his own life, a peace that says Jesus knows exactly who you are, behind all of your masks and deceptions, and he knows everything you've done. And he loves you. And he has prepared a place in eternity for you. And not even death itself can stand in his way of coming to find you, not so that you might leave one other alone in "peace," but that you might take the good news of his gracious love into your homes and your schools and your offices and around the world, so that everyone might come out from behind whatever doors they are hiding and experience the peace of Christ.

Of course, the only way we can share the peace of Christ with others is if we have experienced it ourselves. Again, that is why worship, reading the Bible, daily devotions and prayer are so important. They are the means by which the Holy Spirit infuses us with that "peace of God which surpasses all understanding" (Phil 4:7). It is the same peace that gave Jesus the courage to go obediently to the cross for our sakes. And if the resurrection teaches us anything, it is that God is faithful and trustworthy and more powerful than anything we will ever face in this life. And there is nothing else in all of creation that has the power to fill us with the peace of Christ like knowing that we are known, loved, forgiven, and held in the hands of the God who created us, not just today, but for all eternity. After all, Jesus Christ is risen indeed! And because he lives, we know that we shall live also (John 14:19).

With the afternoon sunshine streaming through the windows — the Robinson Room was at capacity for the 25th Annual Choir Lite Concert on March 18. This special yearly concert began as an informal performance in which choir members could showcase their talents, have some fun and perform secular or popular songs that would not be appropriate for a Sunday Worship Service. Nearly anyone with a musical bent is welcome to participate – previous concerts have featured a ukulele, a barbershop quartet and even a choreographed dance number. For the second year – the charming and witty Jennifer Berg returned as the mistress of ceremonies. The assembled crowd enjoyed musical pieces ranging from 18th Century opera to modern Broadway classics. Some of the highlights include: middle school student Cole Tyson belting out a ballad from the movie "Beauty and the Beast"; Anna Singer and Xiu Ru Liu singing the "purr-fectly" delightful "Cat Duet" by Rossini; and the entire chancel choir swinging to the Irving Berlin standard, "Blue Skies".

There was even a special guest appearance by the world-renowned opera singer (and husband of alto soloist/section leader Xiu Ru Liu) Guenko Guechev. Guenko and Anna Singer performed the flirty duet "La Ci Darem la Mano" from Mozart's Don Giovanni. Tenor soloist Colin Farley led the Youth Choir in a rendition of the modern day choral classic "Praise His Holy Name". The show concluded with the traditional number "As Long as I Have Music" in which former choir members are invited to join in. Craig Dobbins and Raymond Blackwell shared accompanist duties on the piano. And Hayden Moyer provided the beat with his drumming skills.

Each year choir members select a local charity to support with the concert's proceeds. This year the profits were donated to the Quaker Valley Blessings in a Backpack program. Morgan McFadden, a 7th grader at Eden Christian Academy, said a few words about her work with the charity. A national program, Blessings in a Backpack works to provide food on the weekends for school children that might otherwise go hungry. The Chancel Choir was thrilled to be able to donate \$785 to this worthwhile cause.

OUR COMMUNION TABLE IS (ALMOST) 75 YEARS OLD THIS YEAR! By Tim Merrill, SPC Elder

In the History Closet, a letter dated August 14, 1943 from Margaret Campbell to Corporal Alfred H. Johnson was found. She was, of course, the daughter of William Oliver Campbell; Al Johnson was our organist/choirmaster for 41 years. He was on a leave of absence serving in the military in Italy during WWII.

After giving Mr. Johnson the news of the Church, including the line "I had a delightful visit with Miss Agnes Way who was 102 years old last March. It is amazing what strength and interest in people she still has," she concluded her type-written letter with "Best wishes to you, wherever you are, and whatever you are doing. I hope you are able to bring the loveliness of music to the boys over there for you certainly have much to bring them if you are ever given a chance."

Miss Campbell then added a handwritten postscript, "This is a secret – no one knows but the clerical family, my family and you! I am giving a Communion Table as a memorial to Bayard Christy."

Bayard H. Christy had died earlier in 1943, after serving as an Elder of our Church for 32 years (his father, George Christy had been an Elder for 37 years). He wrote several histories of our Church and was a nationally recognized ornithologist.

The Communion Table was dedicated May 7, 1944. It is the work of Leslie Nobbs of New York. "In symbolic language, the carving of the table wood speaks primarily of the sacramental use for which the memorial is intended, yet the symbols chosen are reminiscent, at the same time, of Mr. Christy's life and works. A panel, cut in high relief at the east end of the table, portrays St. Francis of Assisi surrounded by the lovely birds he loved; to the west a similar carving depicts St. Martin of Tours parting his cloak to give warmth to a beggar. The table front is divided by a columnar arrangement of the twelve apostles – each in his separate niche – into three additional panels, the central one of which displays an empty cross supported by adoring angels. At the foot of this central panel are the words, 'Glory to God.' Beneath St. Francis the name is written 'Bayard H. Christy, 1872-1943.' Under St. Martin is the significant inscription, 'And I will give him the morning star.' Along the edge of the mensa, where the celebrant alone can read it, is the text, 'Sir, we would see Jesus.'" (from A Book of Memorials, The Presbyterian Church of Sewickley, Pennsylvania, Thistle House 1946).

WILLIAM OLIVER CAMPBELL PREACHER WEEKEND Guest Preacher: Rev. Paul T. Roberts

We had the great privilege to have Rev. Roberts lead our officers' retreat, worship and adult education over April 7 and 8. The retreat was on Saturday morning in the dining room from 9 AM -12 PM. The topic was the concept of race, which was recently noted as a troubling persistence of an unscientific idea in a recent Newsweek article.

Rev. Roberts challenged the officers to think about the history of racism in this country. We were to think about how opportunities and rights have been inconsistent for all Americans. History has shown that the underlying belief in many of our institutions and communities is that a person of color is inferior, less capable, and undeserving of the same rights and privileges white Americans enjoy. These themes are the similar to what Rev. Michael Stanton from Open Hands ministry spoke about during his series in Adult Education.



Rev. Roberts explained that prejudice is a preconceived idea about something or someone and racism is prejudice that allows for systematic oppression. Rev. Roberts challenged us more personally by showing us excerpts from a couple of popular television shows and a movie depicting racial prejudice. We were asked to discuss these issues in small groups and share how we might personally speak up if we were to find ourselves in a similar situation. For example, if you are at a dinner party and someone has the entire table's attention and is giving his or her opinion about something which is thinly veiled or overtly racist, what do you do? Do you disagree? Do you tell yourself that you don't feel that way and think it's not worth it to speak up? Do you speak up? What do you have to lose? Will you lose your social standing and respect of others? Are you so angry that you are unable to construct a calm response? Do others perhaps feel uncomfortable like you and are also unwilling to challenge these thoughts and opinions? What does it mean to be created in the image of God? What does being a Christian require of us in these moments? These are not easy questions and they bring lots of emotions to the surface. But it is at the surface where we explore and open ourselves to what God has in store for us both personally and as a church.

On Sunday morning, Rev. Roberts preached from Genesis 1:26-27 and Revelation 1:9-19. In Revelation, John is speaking to the seven first century churches of Asia minor. Rev. Roberts suggests that in Revelation we find an assessment of the church with its "depth, breadth, location and identifiable characteristics." It examines what we do well as a church and what we don't do well. He preaches that "We must demand more of ourselves. We must hold ourselves accountable." John poses challenges to us as individuals, as Christians and as a church. What do we do to break free from the bondage of conformity, comfort and repetitiveness? Where is God leading us when we enter a place or relationship where we are certain we have no skill or experience? Will God really be with us? Will He truly equip us for the journey? When we cry out with resistance, is it in fear of failure or fear of change? Can we move into the future with God's help knowing that faith requires us to move without certainty of the outcome?

As the body of the church, all members of that body working together in faith can and should become the church of tomorrow. As the saints of Sewickley Presbyterian Church have done for us, we must also faithfully prepare for the future in grateful response to God's amazing love and faithfulness to us all. Let us continue the momentum.

SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY

The Christy Johnson Scholarship, endowed by her family and administered by Sewickley Presbyterian Church, provides financial support to a member or friend who wishes to pursue a broadening experience in education or service consistent with the unfulfilled direction of Christy's life. The Scholarship provides approximately \$2,000 for travel and living expenses for two or three months for one individual, annually.

Applicants should be a member or friend of Sewickley Presbyterian Church, a high school graduate, under 30 years of age, with a permanent residence in the Sewickley area. Their program should occur outside Western Pennsylvania, include aspects of growth of person and faith, and service to the human community. Those receiving the scholarship are expected to make a written and oral presentation to the congregation and Christy's family upon their return.

in memory of John Alvin McCague (1857-1941)

The east window in the Chapel depicts an Angel of Praise with a golden horn. The window is a memorial to John Alvin McCague, for many years an Elder, church school leader and Clerk of Session.

John Alvin McCague had been raised in Moon Township. He was baptized in, and was a member of, the Sharon Presbyterian Church. He and his wife, Emma Ogden, moved to Sewickley in 1897. In 1900, he was ordained an Elder, serving as Clerk of Session from 1905 to 1938.

The west window depicts an Angel of Prayer, its censor symbolizing prayers rising to God. The window is dedicated to Mary Vernon Charnley, a much beloved church school teacher. Rev. Dr. William Oliver Campbell described her as "one in whom the trials of life seem to evoke more and more the graces of the spirit."

SEWICKLEY STUDENT NIGHT

Last summer a group of local youth workers and I began meeting together to pray, share our excitement for ministry. and dream about what it would look like to collaborate together in ministry. Over the last few months we have been planning to have a night where there were no divisions between our students of denomination, church, school, or clique, but rather an evening where in a shared space we were all one group, one body, one Church. BLANKET SUNDAYS: MAY 6 & 13

Each May we honor the special women in our lives by helping to change someone's life who is in need our of help. Our congregation is actively involved with the Church World Service Blanket Program. For many years, our church has been helping to keep our neighbors warm by providing blankets to families here in the United States and around the world.

What difference can a blanket make? A blanket can provide warmth to a victim of a flood or fire, or serve as bedding to a guest in a homeless shelter, or be a gift of welcome to a newly arrived refugee or migrant worker. Last year blankets made a difference in the lives of families living in Colorado's rugged and rural San Luis Valley. In a remote area of the San Juan Mountains called "the flats," many homes don't have running water or electricity. During the winter, when temperatures drop to life-threatening lows, many of these families heat their homes using only firewood. Often their firewood runs out before the winter ends. That's where our help comes in.

Because of our support of the CWS Blankets Program, Church World Service provides blankets to many organizations and nonprofits, including La Puente, a mission that provides services to the families living in "the flats." At the beginning of last winter, Robert Lockwood, one of the case managers for the Rural Outreach Initiative, delivered the blankets to these families. The warm, wool CWS Blankets were a welcomed gift. Robert, the caseworker who delivered the blankets said, "...we are grateful for the support of Church World Service as we could not do what we do without your continued generosity and belief in our mission. Thank you..."

In May, our church has an opportunity to provide hope to many families. Share this love by providing CWS Blankets to those in need. On May 6 and 13, consider donating a blanket. Each blanket costs only \$10, but these blankets can be a vital resource for someone needing a little support, warmth and encouragement.
