

All of my life I have been a huge I have spent little to no energy in comparison thinking about or preparing for Christmas. Advent is the season leading up to Christmas, a time of anticipation for celebrating the birth of Christ, reflecting on how the Incarnation changed everything. We celebrate hope, peace, joy, and love throughout Advent to remind us and prepare us for the celebration of Christ's birth on Christmas Day. The time spent in Advent focusing on these four themes and the hope of the Incarnation is supposed to make our celebration of Christmas that much better, focusing in on our need for a Savior. In the same way that I have been watching the previous Star Wars movies in preparation for The Last Jedi, in Advent we prepare ourselves for Christmas.

> Maybe you have enjoyed Advent to the fullest this year and have focused in on how great the gift of the Incarnation is to us. But maybe, like me, you have allowed yourself to be distracted by everything else in your life that seems so important at the time that you have almost been robbed of this special time entirely. Maybe it isn't Star Wars that has been distracting you from Jesus this Advent season, but maybe it's been the frantic shopping, cleaning, or mental preparation for those family members that will be visiting soon.

> The scary part of the spiritual life is that there will always be something new to distract us if we allow it. And that's precisely why we have the Church calendar. Maybe the idea of seasons like Advent or Lent are foreign concepts to you (like they were to me for years), but they are part of the Christian year for exactly that reason: to help us focus our attention on Christ rather than allowing the things around us to distract us further. So as you've just celebrated Christmas and are starting a new year, allow the gravity of what this celebration is to move your soul to worshiping God incarnate, Jesus Christ. Amen.



Drawing on his experience as a pastor, therapist, spiritual director, and coach, Rev. Dr. Graham Standish, M.S.W., will explore ways to make your relationships healthier so that your life can become less stressful and more joyful.

Rev. Dr. Graham Standish, who grew up at Sewickley Presbyterian Church, joined the leadership staff of the Samaritan Counseling Center in November, 2017 as Executive Director. Prior to coming to Samaritan, he served for 22 years as the pastor of Calvin Presbyterian Church in Zelienople, PA, where he tripled the size of the congregation and garnered national attention in several studies. One of these studies was done by Diana Butler-Bass who included Calvin Church in her groundbreaking book, *Christianity for the Rest of Us*.

Before his ministry at Calvin, Graham served as a therapist in a pastoral counseling agency, as a drug and alcohol therapist, an intern as a hospital chaplain, and as an associate pastor at a growing church in Murrysville, PA. Graham is an experienced teacher, retreat leader, spiritual director and has a background in individual, marital, and family therapy. Furthermore, he had served on Samaritan's board of directors as well as on the editorial board of Presence, the journal of Spiritual Directors International.

Graham earned his Ph.D. in formative spirituality from Duquesne University, his Master of Social Work from the University of Pittsburgh, and his Master of Divinity from the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.



Read the Bible in just ONE year!

Have you ever wanted to read through the entire Bible but needed some guidance as to how to go about it in the best way? Or are you the kind of person who needs encouragement to stick to

The plan is simple and easy to follow. There are TWO ways to follow the plan:



Download the **Read Scripture** app (it's free!).



Log in on January 1 and begin reading!

Everyday you will read from the Old Testament (or New) and also from the book of Psalms.

At the end of each day's reading, hit the check mark and the app will keep track of how far you have come and how far you have to go!

Begin on January 1!

The plan gives you a day-by-day guide as to what to read.

Check off each day as you read!

Begin on 1.1.2018 & end on 12.24.2018!

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Looking back to 2017, there are a lot of adjectives you could use to describe it. Crazy, hectic, unpredictable, entertaining, etc. but I'm guessing one of the words you would choose, wouldn't be kind. At a glance, kindness wouldn't be seen as an overarching theme of 2017, that is, unless you know the right places to look. Children's Ministry sent out an Advent calendar with 24 ideas for "Random Acts of Christmas Kindness" you could do with your family each day leading up to Christmas. Some of these ideas were simple and pretty easy to do, like "Call a far away relative or friend" on the 11th, or "Let someone go ahead of you in line" on the 7th. Others took a bit more planning. One suggestion was to "Candy Cane Bomb a parking lot," which you may have noticed one of our families taking to heart on December 10th at church. If you were like my wife, your reaction was some sort of a surprised giggle, followed by a look of wonder as you looked to see where it came from, which led to a smile on your face for at least the rest of your drive home (especially if you forgot the candy cane and left it on your windshield like I did). There were a number of other random acts of kindness you may have noticed last month -- some might have been at the direction of our Advent calendar, but some may have just been out of the kindness of someone's heart, unprovoked, and truly random.

When we look at Jesus, he wasn't always nice or polite as we may expect (flipping tables, calling out hypocrisy, etc.), but he was always kind. People often get nice and kind confused, but kindness is more than an action. Have you ever watched a child do something wrong, to then swiftly be told, "Hey, be nice," to which the child responds with a meek "sorry," or a fake smile? Nice can seem shallow, or insincere, but kindness is rarely seen as such. We are called to follow Jesus, and Jesus was, as I said, kind. He was kind to children when others would push them aside. He showed that same kindness to the people he healed, and in His teachings. If we are to truly follow Jesus, kindness should be a part of our lives every day.

As we helped our kids end 2017 with a focus on kindness, I hope that you'll join us in trying to make 2018 more kind, more caring, and more sincere than 2017. There is a lot of work to do in our world, but I know, that with God's help, we can live up to the challenge.

A LOOK AT OUR WINDOWS

"MADONNA AND CHILD"

(Tiffany Studios)

in memory of John Beyers Warden (1865-1890) Elizabeth Fleming Warden (1866-1892)

John and Elizabeth "Bessie" Warden were married in 1889, just one year after Elizabeth was baptized into the church. Mr. Warden died in 1890 at age 25, and Mrs. Warden died two years later at the age of 26. Rev. Dr. William Oliver Campbell said this of Bessie Warden, "My friendship with this beautiful young woman was very close and tender. Compressed within a very few years was all that various service which a pastor is called to render to his people. In July 1888, I baptized her, receiving her into the church on confession of her faith. The next year I married her to Mr. John Warden, and in a short time, she, her husband and child were called home to God. Thus ended a life of beautiful promise."

With the Madonna, robed in white, are symbols representing the star of Bethlehem, the Book of Truth and a crescent moon. The Madonna's veil is an example of creamy opalescent glass, and her robes are drapery glass.

The purpose of Christ's mission, "To deliver man," is inscribed at the base of the window in a colorful panel.
