A WELCOMING FAMILY OF FAITH

Our Vision statement says that we are members of the body of Christ who strive to be a welcoming family of faith. That sounds lovely, doesn't it? Everyone longs to feel welcome and to be a part of a family. The problem is that this doesn't typically happen all by itself. It takes intentional effort to truly become a welcoming church. That's where the word "strive" comes into play. Unless we deliberately set out

to welcome those who come into our church, it often does not happen, at least not very well. Effort is required.

Now, I know that for many of us, when we come to church on a Sunday morning, we see so many friends that we can easily take up the whole morning just catching up and enjoying each other's company. And that is a wonderful thing. When the church gathers together, it should have the celebratory feel of a family reunion. But Jesus doesn't just call us together to celebrate with those who are already a part of his family of grace; he also calls us to welcome all those whom he is calling to become a part of it. That means that we have a job to do.

Just as is true for us as individuals, in order to be a vibrant, healthy church, we need to be dedicated to growing. Of course, this doesn't just mean numerical growth. It also means growth in our spiritual maturity,



Biblical knowledge, financial generosity, relationships, and life of service. But it does include numerical growth, something most mainline churches stopped doing long ago. And while many of us are not comfortable with trying to share our faith with people outside the church and inviting them to come, there are so many people who come through our doors uninvited every week. Jesus has brought them to us. The question is: What kind of stewards are we being of the visitors Jesus brings? He wants them to be a part of our family. How well are we welcoming them and making them feel at home?

When visitors come through our doors for the first time, they typically decide within fifteen minutes if they want to come back. The number one reason why people come back or decide to leave is whether or not they felt welcomed. And while most of us may never become great evangelists, all of us can be friendly and introduce ourselves to people we don't know. And this is so important, for as the author of Hebrews reminds us, "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it" (13:2).

You are such a wonderful and gracious congregation. My family has been so blessed to be a part of this church. And I know that you will do an outstanding job welcoming our new associate pastor, Rebecca Reeder, into the family. But don't forget about the new faces who come to worship every Sunday. Jesus is counting on us to welcome them in his name. And who knows? Maybe even Jesus himself shows up sometimes in the face of a visitor, wondering if there is any "room in the inn." Let's make sure he never decides to leave.

Did you know that the church was given an original gift in 2014 and a subsequent gift in 2016 from a church family to do something in the Senior Manse to weatherproof the house? The three custom doors were installed in June. The original idea was that the gift would cover all 7 of the doors, but as they had to be custom made, only three were done. From Sunday, June 16 until Saturday, June 22, twelve members of our congregation attended Week I of the Montreat Conferences on Worship and Music held at the denomination's national conference center in Montreat, North Carolina.

This year the trek was made by Jeanne Bingman, Pam and Ron Charles, Debbie and Steve Day, Gail Gratton, Linda Liechty, Tina Thomas, Yvonne and Don Zier, and Susan and Craig Dobbins. In addition to daily worship services, Bible study, various levels of handbell ringing, and an adult choir, the group took classes on such topics as "Prayerful Listening and Prophetic Proclamation", "Exploring Economic Justice in the New Testament", "Walking How Jesus Walked, Not Where: The Holy Lands Today",", "Yoga Voice", and "Hymnody". They also took time to explore the western North Carolina Mountains, dined at the well-known Red Rocker Inn, and a few made the short trek into Asheville to visit The Biltmore.

On Saturday, June 8, over a thousand men from all over the Pittsburgh area gathered together at Victory Family Church in Cranberry for the ManUp Pittsburgh Conference, put on by Urban Impact. It was an inspiring day as we were all challenged to be better husbands, fathers, and mentors to the young people in our lives, communities and city. The keynote speaker, Bryan Loritts, pastor of the Abundant Life Christian Fellowship of Silicon Valley, CA, was incredible, charging us to not try to do it alone as men. We all need other men with whom we can be vulnerable and who will challenge us, confront us and support us as we try to be faithful to God and the people in our lives. Loritts said, "You will never lay claim to the fullness God has for you by yourself, apart from friendships." Pittsburgh Steeler coach Mike Tomlin challenged us to take responsibility for the things we need to do and not blame others for our shortcomings: "A man does what he is supposed to do, when and how he is supposed to do it. And when he doesn't, he accepts the consequences." Tight end Vance McDonald talked about the importance



of our faith and the dangers of our pride and ego which can be so damaging in our relationships. He charged us to be caring, consistent, connected, considerate and courageous. There were also excellent speakers for the morning and afternoon breakout sessions, including one led by Rev. Long. All in all, it was an inspiring and challenging day for both young and old. "SO, WHAT IS IT YOU DO?" by Rev. Derek Davenport, Parish Associate Pastor of Discipleship

As a Parish Associate here at SPC, I serve in a part-time capacity. I help lead worship every Sunday throughout the school year and much of the summer. I work with the Discipleship and Adult Education committees regularly and attend staff meetings throughout the year. But my nine to five job is at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. Which, naturally, leads to the question - "So, what is it that you do?"

The short answer is that I direct the Miller Summer Youth Institute (SYI) at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, along with my wife, Erin. Which leads to the next question -"What's that?"

SYI began in 1997, with the goal of helping young people think through two questions - "Who is God calling you to be?" and "What is God calling you to do?" In its first year, SYI functioned as a summer academy for High School students who studied theology with seminary faculty.

SYI has evolved over the years, and today has expanded to offer several different programs. The traditional academy takes place early in the summer, now in conjunction with area colleges and universities who provide college credit. In addition, the institute hosts college interns from around the country who live at the seminary for the summer as they work within their majors. In July, SYI hosts congregations for mission experiences. Throughout the year, the institute supports ministries in Presbyteries, schools, and churches.

So what exactly do I do?

Throughout the school year, Erin and I design and set up the summer programs. We work with our academic and mission partners, and we recruit congregations, interns, and students for the various offerings. We also lead cohorts of pastors and youth leaders. In addition, I speak, preach, teach, and lead retreats for high schools, colleges, universities, judicatories, and churches both in the region and around the country. I write devotionals, Bible studies, lesson plans, and other resources for the seminary's website.

During the summer, I mentor our interns and seminary students and oversee the site directors of the High School Academies and mission programs. Though my schedule can be a bit erratic during the school year due to the timing of events, it's nothing compared to the summer schedule! SYI's summer programming spills over into many late nights and weekends.

As exciting as it is to work with a wide variety of ministries, there's nothing like having a consistent pastoral relationship with a congregation. Over the last six months, I've been blessed to have that opportunity here at SPC. In some ways, the connection is only natural. SPC has had a long history with SYI. In recent years, the staff of SPC like Sarah Bird and Mike Creamer contributed to SYI programming. Jeremy Fisher, SPC's associate director of music ministries, has served as SYI's music director for the last ten years. A whole group from the church participated in an SYI mission experience last year. But the relationship is much deeper than that. In 1997, the pastors and congregation of SPC were instrumental in designing and starting SYI, even providing staff for the inaugural academy.

"So, what is it that you do?"

It's not a question with a short answer. Perhaps the best response is that I continue a legacy of ministry to young people that SPC helped start more than twenty years ago.

As we journey through this time of transition as a congregation, I am so excited to continue in my role as parish associate in the months and years ahead. As my family wraps up their obligations, you'll start seeing more of them over the coming months. I look forward to continuing my work alongside the outstanding staff here at SPC, and to working with our new associate pastor.

A TALE OF THREE DAVIDS

David McFarlane retired as Pastor of Presbyterian Church, Sewickley, in 2003. Shortly after he left, church member David Sandberg, for some unknown reason, found himself in that part of SPC's administrative offices and spied a leaded glass, Celtic cross in Rev. McFarlane's vacated office. The cross was an interesting artifact, obviously very old. With its lead came joints very brittle with age, and many small broken pieces of glass. It was leaning in a corner, and bending precariously.

Sandberg recognized it as an important relic of the church and felt that it should somehow be preserved. Having had some experience with designing and making leaded glass windows, he asked Laura Mikush if he could take it home, study it, and determine if it was reparable. Laura consented, and Sandberg took it to examine it more closely. After scrutinizing it, he concluded it to be a more daunting project than he had originally thought. The lead joints were very old and had become very inelastic and resistant to any annealing with new lead. Also, the many pieces of broken glass would be very difficult to replace.

The cross hung on a chain by David's workbench for a while. He would examine it from time to time, scratch his head, and the cross would continue to hang. It eventually found its way to a shelf above the workbench, and for all intents and purposes was almost forgotten, except for Sandberg's nagging conscience.

A windstorm visited Sewickley around 2008 that toppled three large trees on Sandberg's property. Church member Dave Mitchell learned of Sandberg's dilemma of fallen trees and his need to clear the them and convert them to two-foot fireplace logs – more than he could handle by himself. True to form, Dave Mitchell volunteered to help and showed up one morning with two chain saws. On a break from cutting wood, and over cups of coffee and some idle conversation, Sandberg showed Dave Mitchell the leaded glass cross. He was intrigued with its antiquity and felt as Sandberg did that it should somehow be salvaged and eventually featured in the Church. Over subsequent meetings, Mitchell came up with the idea of a light box and how it could be displayed in some prominent area of the Church.

The Sandbergs sold their house in 2010. As the Sandbergs settled into a new home, and with the move out of the way, David Sandberg's interest in the cross was rekindled. But he couldn't find it! He mistakenly concluded that it must have been left behind in the previous residence and asked the new owners several times to search various nooks and crannies where it might have been stored. Fortunately, the cross was found.

After ruminating over the annealing problem, Sandberg figured out how to solve it: copper. He had a roll of sticky-backed copper foil, about ¼" wide. Cutting about 400 pieces into ¾ inch lengths, he stuck them on the perimeter of the cross, thereby making it possible to anneal new copper-wrapped glass to the old lead of the cross. The cross was augmented with new glass, converted to a frameable rectangle, and delivered to Dave Mitchell to fit within a lightbox.

Mitchell designed the light box, four inches deep, wired it, lighted it with LED lights, stained the box, and designed a base for it. Dave Mitchell was also instrumental in conceiving the Faith House restoration. It was timely that the construction of the light box and completion of the Faith House coincided. For a while, the completed framed cross resided there, but now is better displayed at the entrance to the Church's administrative offices.



Both Daves who worked on the project contacted David McFarlane in Charlottesville, Virginia, in an effort to discover the origins of the old cross. McFarlane's recollection was that the Church's one-time custodian, Pete, would often find old curiosities in the basement of the Church and show them to Rev. McFarlane. Other than that, nobody seems to know of the history of the cross. Nevertheless, it must be very old and a part of SPC's 181-year old history. Perhaps someone in the Church's membership may eventually read this and be able to shed light on the mystery as to whether was a part of the current structure or built prior to the Civil War.



If our kids have learned anything at VBS this year, it is that God is good! As I'm writing this, our Vacation Bible School has just ended and I'm slowly working my way through the mess of the week. On the first day of camp every year there are naturally tears, kids who don't want to leave their parents, an overwhelming room packed with more than 70 kids and teenagers, and not seeing a friend your mom promised was going to be there are all a perfect recipe for anxiety. Through my work with the preschool and our Sunday School classes, I knew most of these crying faces, and there was one in particular that I was sure wasn't going to make it. We'll call this Child A. Child A rarely attended our events, was often plastered to mom or dad's leg, and was, for lack of a better word, very shy. I introduced Child A to some of their group leaders, and crossed my fingers that it would work out, but I wasn't very confident. After all, what could a couple of teenagers do that I couldn't? I am happy to say that I was proven very wrong. I poked my head into games that day, and there was Child A, laughing, running, and having a very intense stare down with one of the counselors. The next day, Child A ran into our sanctuary with a high five and a happy face and never looked back. It's in VBS each year that I see the vast reach of the Kingdom where a group of volunteers join together to spread the love of Christ.

One thing I've seen from working in ministry for so long is that if you know where to look, you'll see Jesus. He shows up, seemingly out of nowhere, and unexpectedly changes someone's life. Jesus showed up with Child A and the counselors. He left his mark all over the Faith House and the stories that were shared between children as they heard about the far reaches of God's Kingdom. He was there the Sunday after camp in a card, telling of the impact this church had on someone's grandchild, and He showed up in worship with thunderous applause in our sanctuary.

As many of you know, this will be the last article you will read from me this year. This church has been a blessing to me and my family, and I look forward to sharing the gifts and skills that I've learned here as I continue to do God's work elsewhere. As I look forward to what lies ahead, I want to thank you all for the kind words and open arms. Thank you for trusting me with the children of this church. They have truly touched my heart. And thank you again for the lovely send off. It takes a lot to get Presbyterians to clap in church, so I must have really earned it! As I look ahead, I am reminded of our VBS themes, and that "When life is unfair, scary, sad, changes, and especially when it is good, God is good!"

Are you wondering how you can help in this time of transition? Now more than ever, we will need some extra volunteers. Children's Church is still running throughout the summer. We need storytellers and a second set of hands. If you think you can spare 30 minutes on any particular Sunday this summer, I encourage you to contact the church office to be in touch with our Children's Ministry committee, or sign up on our church website to help. 

But the building project isn't what made this trip special (though it was part of it). We got to know our homeowners, hear their stories and share our own, and break bread with them. We had a great time bonding with the other two churches with us and hanging out back at the center every day. It was a special week and I am immensely grateful that I could share it with our team.

MEET OUR FIFTH MISSION PARTNER

"If one member suffers, all suffer together." 1 Corinthians 12:26. SPC has developed a strong relationship with Meeting God in Missions (MGM), and the people who work in the sugar cane fields around Hato Mayor, Dominican Republic. We have made four trips to Hato Mayor, and are planning a fifth in January, 2020. During these trips, we have met Dr Yasquina Benjamin, a young woman who grew up in the cane fields, went to medical school in DR, and returned to her home batey (village) to provide medical care to those who live and work in the cane fields. Most of these people do not have ready access to even basic medical care.

Some of us helped MGM build her home and small clinic in Marguarita, the batey where she lives. Those of us who do the medical clinics have worked alongside Yasquina for the last three years. Two separate years, we collected money to pay for surgery for a broken leg for two young men, who would otherwise be disabled for life. Yasquina facilitated these surgeries, and negotiated with the surgeon for a lower price. The Swans have paid her tuition for training in ultrasound, allowing her to better diagnose problems without X-ray. The Mission Committee has approved \$10,800 per year to support Yasquina in her work. This will help with her living expenses and cover the cost of her medical supplies. Groups from SPC visit DR for one week every January, but through our support of Yasquina, we can also be present the other 51 weeks of the year.

Dear Ms. Swan,

Good morning! I am a recipient of the Dr. and Mrs. William Campbell Memorial scholarship this semester and I would like to share with you and your church my journey this term.

This semester was a very huge blessing and adventure for me. I started working as Graduate Assistant for Community Engagement which gave me the opportunity to work with organizations in Harrisonburg. The more I am exposed, the more I realized how indigenous peoples seem to be invisible. I rarely hear their narratives and I have only met one indigenous person since coming here. It sort of became my advocacy to include indigenous peoples' voices in whatever I am doing or at least to ask where they are. At the end of semester, the Center Justice and Peacebuilding (CJP) gave me a recognition because of that. It was a beautiful surprise!

This summer, I searching for ways to engage with the Monacan nation. It is my hope that they will engage with CJP in various ways to teach us their story and teach us what would peace and justice look like for them. Then again, that would be up to them. My topmost objective is to visit them to pay my respect as an indigenous person to another indigenous peoples. Pray with me for this?

This summer, I am taking classes for the Graduate Certificate for Social Entrepreneurship. It has been very interesting to be in a class with MBA students. I also got two mentors this semester. Both of them are our teachers. They taught me a lot and loved me a lot too! They are two of God's most beautiful blessings for me this term. It confirmed AGAIN that I always am in the right place at the right time.
