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# Our Only Hope By Rev. Kevin J. Long



"Help me, Obi Wan Kenobi! You're my only hope." Those iconic words spoken by Princess Leia have been etched into the brains of many of us who grew up in the 1970s. I still remember as a six-year old kid seeing the lines coming out of the movie theaters to see Star Wars. It was revolutionary, shaping the imaginations of an entire generation and changing the movie industry forever. I have many mixed feelings about the arrival of the final installment of the third trilogy which brings an end to a story that was such a huge part of my childhood.

There are so many memorable lines and scenes from the various Star Wars films. But Leia's desperate words to Obi Wan have always stuck with me: "You're my only hope." We often feel that way, don't we, that our lives are utterly depending on someone or something to save us, whether it be a new job or a raise or a new relationship or a baby or a medical miracle. I'm sure many people are counting on this new year to magically wipe away our past and give us a whole new life. We put so much hope in things that, while they might help us or make us feel better for a while, they cannot ultimately save us. That's because everyone and everything in this world is also in need of saving, and none of it will last.

Fortunately, we have just celebrated at Christmas the arrival of the one true hope of the world, the only one

who can save us all: Emmanuel, the God who is with us. The Apostle Paul reminds us of Isaiah's prophetic words about Jesus, "The root of Jesse shall come, the one who rises to rule the Gentiles; in him the Gentiles shall hope" (Rom 15:12). Indeed, he is our only hope.

We hope in Jesus because, by the miracle of the Incarnation, he is one of us, and he knows what we are going through. He lived a life of perfect obedience to God on our behalf, even to the point of dying for our sins on the cross. We hope in Jesus because he is also "the living God, who is the Savior of all people, especially of those who believe" (1 Tim 4:10). As the Word of God through whom all things came into being, it is he alone who has the power to give us the abundant life and to make all things new. And he invites us to become a part of his story, a story that because of his resurrection will never come to an end.

As we enter not just a new year but a new decade, remember that Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever, and he will be with you to face whatever comes your way. And that is always a reason for hope. So perhaps in this new year, our new daily prayer ought to be: "Help me, Jesus Christ! You're my only hope."

## 2019 Deacon Christmas Food Basket Project

Saturday, December 14 was an overcast, soggy, bone-chilling day. Given this circumstance, most people would react by adding an extra log on the fireplace and snuggling up with a good book. But this was not the case for 54 SPC volunteers who chose instead to rise early and devote their time and energy to the delivery of baskets of food to our neighbors in need.

Collectively, these volunteers delivered food baskets to 77 households (representing a total of 297 household members) in Glenfield, Sewickley, Leetsdale, Baden, Ambridge and Fair Oaks. Due to the abundance of food donated and a slightly lower than usual number of referrals from social service organizations, each recipient household received an extraordinary amount of food this year.

#### BY THE NUMBERS

In the final analysis, members and friends of SPC donated 125 units of ketchup, 82 containers of mayonnaise, 119 bottles of mustard, 226 cans of beans, 236 tins of tuna and chicken, 206 cans of soup, 122 boxes of cereal, 111 cans of coffee, 91 boxes of tea, 97 containers of cocoa, 91 boxes of oatmeal, 170 boxes of pasta, 123 jars of spaghetti sauce, 141 jars of peanut butter, 107 jars of jelly, 97 packages of dried fruit and raisins and 91 containers of nuts! There was also \$5965.00 donated to help with purchasing fresh food to accompany the other items.

The Board of Deacons extends its sincere thanks to all of the referring organizations, food donors, financial contributors, Turkey Trot participants, packing volunteers, delivery volunteers, Laura Mikush and others who generously contributed to the successful implementation of this project.

## A Week with Dr Yasquina

Dr. David Swan traveled to the Dominican Republic from October 28 to November 1 to shadow our newest mission partner, Dr. Yasquina Benjamin, who was born and raised in Marguarita, a small batey (village) in the sugarcane fields in the Dominican Republic. She was able to attend medical school in DR. After graduation, she moved back to Marguarita to serve those who live and work in the sugarcane fields. Most of these people are ethnic Haitians who have lived in the DR for generations but have no official standing or rights in that country.

David spent three days with Yasquina as she went about her typical workday. She sees about 25 patients a week in the clinic attached to her home in Marguarita. She has an ultrasound machine in the clinic and performs about 50 ultrasounds a month. She provides prenatal care, pediatric care, and primary care for people with diabetes and high blood pressure. She also sutures lacerations and does some minor office surgery. For patients who need more care or surgery, she facilitates referral to nearby medical facilities, and helps with transportation.

David was able to go with Yasquina on two of her outreach visits. The first was to a school in a remote village, reachable only with four-wheel drive. She taught 38 students the basics of dental hygiene, using a large dental model. After instruction, she had each student demonstrate on the model. At the end, each student received a toothbrush and toothpaste. David can attest to the need for such instruction as he worked with dentists last year who were pulling decayed teeth from children as young as thirteen.

The second visit to a different village was a session with about twenty women to discuss women's health issues. An important topic was managing menstrual cycles. These women do not have access to tampons and sanitary napkins used by women in the U.S., nor do they have safe ways of disposing of these items once they are used. Dr. Yasquina taught them about reusable cloth pads and reusable menstrual cups. At the end, each woman was given her own menstrual cup.



Our mission budget includes \$10,800 to support Dr. Benjamin in her work. Half of this amount is part of her income to help support her and her family - her schoolteacher husband and three children. The other half supports her medical mission. Out of this money she buys medication for her patients and the items she distributes at her outreach visits, such as the toothbrushes, toothpaste, and menstrual cups. During his visit, David learned that Yasquina is well respected for her ministry and hard work. We can be confident that our mission dollars are helping to provide much needed medical care and basic healthcare education to people in need. It is a blessing to be able to work with Dr. Benjamin in this way.

## A God Moment By Nancy Merrill, SPC Member

In mid-December, our Knitting for Mission group decided to donate some of its hand-knit items that didn't sell at the mission fair to the Center for Hope. Stephanie O'Kane, a member of the group, delivered the items to the Center and reported the following to her fellow knitters. When I got to the Center, there was a lady in front of me at the desk talking with the volunteer and Sue Otto, director of the Center. I heard them telling her to try "toys for tots" but I was not really paying attention to the conversation. When Sue finished, I introduced myself and told her I was with our group and we wanted to see if she could use some hats and scarves. She asked, "They are new? They are hand-knit? And you don't care what I do with them?" I told her yes, and she could do with them as she saw fit. Sue said, "We are having a God moment."

She returned to the lady who had been in front of me and asked, "Could you use brand new, hand-knit hats and scarves for your grandchildren?" The woman very happily looked through our items and chose for each of her grandchildren. Sue explained to me, "This woman came to see if we had anything she could give to her grandchildren for Christmas. I didn't think we could help her until you walked through the door two minutes later with these lovely hats and scarves. This is what I call a God moment."
