


"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. " (1 Peter 4:10)

As we head into the final weeks of 2020, it's time to take a look at the church's year-end financial position, even as we are planning for fiscal year 2021. In this peculiar season of coronavirus, we actually have some pretty good news to report.

As SPC reacted to unprecedented mitigation to slow the spread, flatten the curve, keep ourselves and others as safe as possible, we didn't know what it would mean to church income and expenses. Our office was closed, we weren't able to worship together in the sanctuary for months, and we had to quickly put together a way for us to more meaningfully worship online. We had no experience, no economic history to study!

In response to our needs for video streaming technology, we received very generous donations to finance the necessary purchases of lighting, cameras, video switching equipment, installation, wiring, etc. We were up and running so quickly, thanks to those gifts and the diligent work of church staffers Dave Breit and Jennifer Johnson and the technology committee.

At the same time, Business Manager Laura Mikush researched and applied for the federally funded Paycheck Protection Program (PPP). While this program, unsurprisingly, wasn't without its quirks, we were ultimately approved for funding that helped us cover the salaries of our staff for a 10-week period. We expect that this 'loan' will be fully forgiven, as that was always the intent of the program. The PPP money gave us ample 'room to breathe' over the course of the year.

As you all know, we made the difficult decision to not hold our beloved Day on the Lawn, which funds so much of our mission effort. Thanks to our SPC members, our Days off the Lawn campaign did raise a generous amount for the mission committee's distribution.

While pledged income and plate offerings are somewhat behind budget, our expenses are also under, so our current picture, as of November 30, is actually a good one. Though we have one more month, and there is no way to know for certain how December will unfold, we do expect that trend to continue.

Our SPC staff has done an amazing job in these many months of difficult circumstances, and we're thankful for each of them.

And, of course, we are also humbly grateful to all of you, our generous SPC congregation, for your faithful gifts throughout the year! Thank you!

It has been a particularly difficult decision for me to say Good Bye to you, because the Czech Republic an the ECCB in particular has been has been and will be close to my feelings about Central Europe. The Czech Republic has been among the first and closest partners in Central Europe I have visited in my position as a regional liaison for Central and Eastern Europe and Roma since 2001. I learned a lot from you and our cooperation and friendship have become of high value for me. And of course to leave is particularly difficult in times when a face to face visit is not possible.

I'm extremely thankful for the privilege to have served with the Middle East and Europe Office of World Mission for many years and together with you help building bridges between Christians in PC(USA) and ECCB.

I'm full of gratitude for many I have worked with in ECCB, in Diakonia and the faculty It was a blessing to work with so many faithful and committed people. I have truly learned a lot from you all and I'm thankful for the contributions of PCUSA (and CoS) mission coworkers as well as for the ECCB-PC(USA) partnership network.

DAYS OFF THE LAWN

Giving to Benefit Local, City, and Global Mission

SPC mission giving is bolstered each year by the hard work of so many members of our congregation to host Day on the Lawn. This year, we were unable to safely host the annual rummage sale, but many of the mission organizations who benefit from this support are responding to increased need in the communities they serve while also adapting their operations to maintain safe practices during the pandemic.

Through the generous and creative contributions of the congregation, this year's Days Off the Lawn generated \$35,486 to support mission organizations. In addition to donations, members of the congregation organized yard sales and refurbished computers to collect donations. SPC kids even designed a cookbook to support mission. More than 25 organizations working to provide shelter, medical

HELPING TO FEED OUR NEIGHBORS IN 2020

Food insecurity in southwestern Pennsylvania increased from 10.8% in 2018 to 15.4% 2020 as a result of the coronavirus pandemic and its economic impact according to a recent study by Feeding America. The impact was even greater for children. Twenty-four percent of children in the 11-county region served by the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank experienced food insecurity in 2020 compared to 15.5% in 2018.

Several local organizations are working tirelessly to meet this increased need as well as quickly adapt their operations to safely distribute meals and food items. Our church has provided support to these organizations providing hunger relief by:

- Volunteering to pack and distribute take-away meals at the Center for Hope, the Ladle, and Bethlehem Haven women's shelter.
- From March-December, SPC served 1,850 Grab 'n Go dinners at the Center for Hope (an increase to 185/month in 2020 from 65-100/month in 2019).
- Pre-packaged meals were provided monthly for 30 women staying at Bethlehem Haven women's shelter.
- The Ladle served 140-175 Grab n' Go meals every Monday through 20+ partner organizations, including SPC's support for four dinners.
- Total Sit Down Meals at the Ladle: 2018: 3933, 2019: 3490, 2020: 5920
- Collecting in-kind donations to stock the pantries at Center for Hope, Sewickley Community Center, and the Ladle.
- Providing monetary support through the monthly hunger offering donations and allocations from our annual mission committee budget to The Center for Hope, the Ladle, Sewickley Community Center, Pittsburgh Presbytery Hunger Fund, Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank, Northside Common Ministries, Bethlehem Haven and Meals on Wheels.
- In partnership with the Sewickley YMCA, the Hammer and Nails sub-committee built five Little Free Pantries where neighbors can take what they need or donate items directly. These pantries, brightly painted by SPC youth, offer a bit of hope to those in need. The Neighbors in Need sub-committee will be collecting items to help stock the pantries starting this month.

Thank you for your continued and increased support throughout 2020 to helping our neighbors access enough food for their families.

October 2020 was to be the year Pittsburgh hosted visitors from Malawi and South Sudan as part of the Pittsburgh International Partnership. This 26-year-old partnership pairs congregations in Pittsburgh Presbytery and in Blantyre Synod, Malawi. Seven years ago, South Sudan was added, forming a tripartite partnership. It was with great disappointment that the planned visit was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In the meantime, we have been holding Zoom meetings with members of the partnership. The theme of these meetings has been Signs of Hope. Despite the challenges of different time zones and unreliable Internet these meetings have been a blessing to all involved. We have heard about food distributions in flooded areas of South Sudan. We have shared how our congregations are managing

services with social distancing. We have shared in the joy of confirmation classes and weddings. It is helpful to hear how our brothers and sisters in other parts of the world are dealing with their challenges and continuing God's work in difficult circumstances. Our Mission Committee has sent \$7,000 through the Partnership to be divided between food relief in South Sudan and Zumba Theological Seminary in Blantyre Synod.

We hope and pray we will be able to host brothers and sisters from Malawi and South Sudan in October 2021. We need a new leader for the SPC partnership with our sister congregation, Chonde CCAP. If you would consider this, contact Barbara Swan (barbdavidswan@comcast.net).




BACKPACKS IN JULY

Even a small scholarship can mean a lot to an international student pursuing an education in the United States. Below are the responses received upon informing recipients of their Campbell Scholarship awards.

"Please tell your church how much they blessed me." Tala Bautista successfully passed her thesis for an MA in Conflict Transformation at the Center for Justice and Peacebuilding at Eastern Mennonite University in June 2020. She is now working on her one-year practical training, including pursuing certification as a trainer for Strategies for Trauma Awareness and Resilience. Her goal after completing her training is to return to the Philippines and continue her work in local communities. She received \$2,000 in 2019 and \$3,000 in 2020.

"Thank you so much for giving me this opportunity and allowing God to bless me through this organization." Joy Wade is from Liberia, and is studying for her LPN at Ultimate Health School in Manassas, VA. She expects to graduate in February 2021. She has not had an easy life. She was physically and emotionally abused by her father, which adversely affected her college schoolwork. She was recently homeless but is now being sheltered by a caring family. Her goal is to become a physician. She received \$2,000 in 2020.

"I am so glad and grateful that you have given me this scholarship in support of my degree pursuit at Lancaster Bible College." Golden Aina, from Nigeria, is pursuing a Master of Divinity at Lancaster Bible College, with expected graduation in the spring of 2022. Citing a past addiction to pornography, his stated goal is to become a pastor and start a ministry "that empowers men to live according to the full potential that God has called them." He received \$2,500 in 2020.

"Oh, this is huge, I can't believe it really." Mariana Adel, another student at Center for Justice and Peacebuilding at Eastern Mennonite University is from Egypt. She is studying Restorative Justice with expected completion of a master's degree in May 2021. She was traumatized when her father left the family when she was seven years

old. During her work with impoverished children in Cairo, Egypt, she saw physical and emotional violence used as discipline. Her goal is to change the normalization of violence and "to help targeted parents to heal from their own traumas and learn tools to create a safe environment for their children." She received \$2.500 in 2020.

"Please express my appreciation to the Scholarship and Mission Committees and all involved for the beautiful gesture of Christ's love and care they have shown to me. Much appreciated." Oscar Siwali graduated from Center for Justice and Peacebuilding at Eastern Mennonite University with a Master of Conflict Transformation on May 3, 2020. He has returned to Cape Town, South Africa where he is director and founder of SADRA Conflict Transformation, an organization that works to build a society that embraces non-violence and peaceful methods of resolving differences. He received \$2,000 in 2019 and \$2,500 in 2020.

"Receiving your email made me just jump and dance for joy!" Crisol Gonzalez is from Chihuahua, Mexico. She is pursuing a Master of Arts in Transformational Leadership at the Center for Justice and Peacebuilding at Eastern Mennonite University. Her goal is to introduce restorative justice practices into the public educational system in her area, and eventually the country. She received \$2,500 in 2020.

"My joy knows no bounds at receiving this email. Once again, thanks for this huge assistance and your generosity. May the good Lord keep moving His Church forward. Amen!" Oluyemi Adebowale, from Nigeria, is working toward a Doctorate in New Testament Theology at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He plans to return to Nigeria to minister within the Nigerian Baptist Convention, and to work on church planting. He received \$2,000 in 2019 and \$2,500 in 2020.

WORSHIP NEEDS: WILL YOU HELP?

Without hesitation I can say "What a year it's been!" We've all made adjustments, big and small, involving work, school, travel, family, friends, and even life at home. I could never have imagined all the changes I've been through since March. There have been both positives and negatives over the past 10 months.

One BIG positive is our ability to now worship at home via video streaming. For years we've been able to listen to our worship services live, and video is a welcome addition.

It's been fun, exciting, a challenge, and a huge learning experience for all involved in getting our sanctuary set-up with the necessary equipment to video stream. We're still learning and still adjusting, and we are happy to have our processes set up and a smooth-running system now.

There are, of course, many steps to video streaming our worship service. Beginning early in the week our staff plans the service and the order of worship. We create the slides, including the Call to Worship, scripture reading, song lyrics, the Children's Message videos, and other worship elements shown on the screen in the sanctuary and on your viewing devices. Finally, the staff puts together a "tech version" of the bulletin/order of worship detailing the camera shots and other notes for the service.

Both staff members and volunteers help run the video streaming equipment. One person advances the slide-show, and one or two operate the video switcher, which simply changes the on-screen view as the service proceeds, that is, the slides that show you song lyrics, scripture, etc., as well as video of the sanctuary, view of the pulpit and the musicians.

While it sounds (and maybe looks) complicated, it's really not. It does require focus, the ability to push buttons and to follow the tech notes. We've successfully trained folks to work the slideshow and switcher, and we always need more help, as more volunteers help to make the load lighter for all.

Here's what to expect: when a Sunday tech volunteer/staff arrives on Sunday morning, the preparation work is already complete. The team does a quick review of the service, and then the slideshow and switcher operators follow the tech bulletin as the worship service moves along, ensuring that viewers at home see the service as close as possible to being there in person.

Aspects of leading music during worship in this unique time in which we find ourselves living and working are both familiar and new. Because our 9 AM and 11 AM worship services have been live streamed for over two years, continuing to do so was no problem for our Associate Director of Music Ministries, Jeremy Fisher, and me, nor for the clergy and IT persons involved. Because persons were not permitted to attend, the decision was quickly made to hold and broadcast only one service, in which contemporary and traditional music would be blended.

However, because of the recommendations from the Center for Disease Control and other federal and state agencies, suddenly beginning on Sunday, March 22, 2020, we were wearing masks, socially distanced, and limited to only ten persons, i.e., usually only four musicians, two worship leaders, and the persons needed to technologically handle the broadcast of the service. During this time before our services began to be also broadcast visually, when asked by church members about the layout and feel in the Sanctuary, I would respond that it looked like and felt like a recording studio. Other staff members and I were pleased to arrive on Sundays very casually attired.

Once the broadcast included the visual, as well as the aural, aspects of the service beginning on May 24, 2020, the Sanctuary remained as it had been since March 22, 2020. However, when in-person worship began on September 13, 2020, the Sanctuary was configured as it is currently, in order to open up sight lines for better shots of the pulpit and to keep the musicians safely distanced from congregational members. Also, shortly after in-person worship resumed, the Flower Committee graciously resumed creating beautiful floral arrangements each Sunday. They add so much to the feel of the room.

Much of the order of worship remained from pre-pandemic days until persons returned to the Sanctuary. However, as persons in the pews are recommended not to sing by the CDC, since mid-September there are fewer musical pieces aimed for congregational involvement.

In addition, I was delighted when Session made the decision to resume the celebration of The Lord's Supper monthly beginning on World Communion Sunday, October 4, 2020. Celebrating Communion has been welcomed by those who attend in person, as well as those who drive to the church to pick up the prepackaged Communion wafer and grape juice shared in the service as they depart. On October 4, about thirty persons came to the church in the early afternoon to pick up the packets and on November 1 the number was in the mid-twenties.

During the pandemic, most committees, Bible studies and other covenant groups, and even the knitters continued to function virtually via Zoom. However, it has been impossible for musical ensembles to meet and, because of the numbers of persons involved and the necessity for distancing, it has been impossible for the musical ensembles of the church to rehearse and participate in worship leadership. Many of you have told me via e-mail, text, and in person how much you miss this aspect of our worship services.

Please know that both Jeremy and I look forward to the time when it will be safe for us to gather regularly with singers, instrumentalists, and handbell ringers. That day cannot arrive quickly enough. Meanwhile, know that you and your loved ones are in our thoughts and prayers. We miss regularly interacting with you, too.
