Our congregation has decided to spend this year reading the Bible together. After the events of this past year, we find ourselves in the midst of so many transitions with more on the horizon. That's why we've decided to anchor ourselves in scripture.

We have a lot of Bibles in our church. Some of them are about as old as our church, dating back to the 1800s. We have one from Shields Presbyterian. We have one from the 1880s. We have some from former friends of our church and families of our congregation.

At one point, part of a story too long for this article, our church dedicated several items to be used in worship, including a chancel Bible. During the service, a former pastor, Lockhart Amerman, delivered the sermon. In his remarks, he said something fascinating about what it is like to worship at Sewickley Presbyterian Church. It works pretty well today – just substitute the name "Dobbins" for "Johnson:"

I think that perhaps in all our services we talk too much and listen too little. I am not speaking now of the immediate sounds, of what I have to say in a sermon, or of what this splendid new choir sings to you, or even of the loveliness that Mr. Johnson brings to us from the organ. These things are only vehicles for the Real Voice. Behind them there are deeper, truer sounds, the vibrations of deity, the speech of Wisdom, and the song of beauty. Have you ever listened to this old church with its whispered memories of bygone worshippers? If you find it hard to pray, there are hundreds of prayers for you to choose from in this wood and this stone and these arches.

I love this notion of listening behind the sounds. Listening to the "whispered memories of bygone worshipers." There is something so powerful about being part of a community of faith that reaches back before our own time — a community that prayed, pledged, and prepared for us.

So, of course, we strive to do the same, praying, pledging, and preparing for the next generations, gathering for worship either in person or on-line. As we do, so many of the things we see and hear point us to something deeper. Something greater. Something eternal.

And that brings us back to what we are doing this year. That's why we have chosen, in the midst of transition, to spend this year studying the Bible together. It helps us listen to what God is doing in our midst – to join our ears and hearts and prayers to those of our parents or grandparents, those of friends and neighbors from generations before us. We are studying the Bible together to listen to the "deeper, truer sounds, the vibrations of deity, the speech of Wisdom, and the song of beauty."

CHRISTMAS FOOD BASKETS

Let's face it. Food is essential to sustain life. In fact, it forms the very foundation for our development as human beings. Don't underestimate the power of food in our lives. Our personal choices of food are a major determinant of our health and well-being. It serves as a social common denominator, keeping us connected with family and friends. It is a source of comfort in our lives. It's no wonder that food is uppermost in our thinking.

Every November, the Board of Deacons organizes a Christmas food basket project to address food insecurity in the Glenfield-Sewickley-Leetsdale-Ambridge area. In order to accomplish the goal of distributing 100 food baskets to our neighbors, cash donations are needed to purchase the food. In addition, 65 volunteer delivery teams are needed to distribute the food baskets to the recipients.

Due to COVID, it was necessary to make some changes to our processes in 2020 that we are continuing this year. Instead of shopping for actual items, we ask that you sponsor either a partial basket, a full basket, or donate for more than one basket. One basket is \$150. To reach our goal of 100 baskets, we will need to raise \$15,000. Safran's grocery store will take care of the shopping and will even put the baskets together for us! SPC's delivery volunteers will make sure that each food-insecure recipient will receive a food basket on the morning of December 18.

PCUSA and ECCB Partners Convene Virtually to Encourage one Another in Faith

I long to see you so that I may impart to you some spiritual gift to make you strong—that is, that you and I may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith.

Romans 1:11-12

The PC(USA) and SPC have a long and active partnership with the Evangelical Church of the Czech Brethren (ECCB). Over the years there have been many exchanges between our church and partners in the Czech Republic, including conferences in both the US and Czech Republic, visits from ECCB members and pastors to our congregation, and a SPC mission trip to the Czech Republic in 2018. While the partnership conference planned for 2021 in the Czech Republic was postponed to 2023 due to pandemic travel restrictions, partners found new ways to meet and encourage one another in faith.

In March 2021, more than 55 participants from many congregations in the US and the Czech Republic joined Prayer and Praise in the Pandemic: A Conversation about worship in the Season of COVID-19. Dr. Petr Slama, professor at the Protestant Theological Faculty in Prague opened the meeting with theological introduction about the meaning of worship. This was followed by witnesses from three congregations from the US and the Czech Republic about worship in this season and break-out discussions for participants to meet and share their own experiences.

A second meeting focused on the involvement of youth in the church was hosted in October 21. Discussions were led by Jan Dostal and Jan Levicky of the ECCB together with Rev. Sarah Bird Kneff and Destini Hodges, interim coordinator of the PCUSA Young Adult Volunteer Program. Participants discussed youth involvement in civil society and as leaders in the church as well as how summer camps, conferences, and volunteer opportunities provide opportunities for growing one's faith.

The ECCB has more than 70,000 members and 250 congregations in the country and is the largest Protestant denomination in a very secular society. Over the years, SPC members have been encouraged in our faith by hearing our friends in the ECCB church share their testimonies of how their faith and church persevered through four decades of communism. Today, we continue to be encouraged in faith as we meet online and share questions about worship and education, Christian life and witness and the mission of the church in society and worldwide with our Czech partners. Partners are also working to create a joint advent devotional for 2021 that will be available to SPC members.

WORK and Medical Benevolence Foundation Lend Support for Haiti Earthquake Relief

On August 14, a 7.2 magnitude earthquake hit southwestern Haiti about 90 miles from the capital city of Port-au-Prince. UNICEF estimates that more than 1.5 million people were affected by the earthquake, including more than 500,000 children; an estimated 30,000 people have been left homeless. Two mission organizations, WORK and the Medical Benevolence Foundation, were among the first to respond, and the SPC mission committee approved \$10,000 above and beyond our annual giving to these organizations to support their relief efforts.

WORK's mission is to accompany families in Haiti out of poverty through good, dignified jobs. They support landfill communities providing wrap-around services with an end goal of placing two heads of the household into a dignified job. Two days after the earthquake, WORK sent a 6-member team of Haitian staff and program graduates to check on the families impacted and address critical needs including medical needs, burial support, mental health support, supply and food distribution, and construction of temporary shelters. WORK is continuing to raise funds to rebuild as many homes as possible; they estimate ~90 new homes



will be needed for families in the Les Cayes area, one of the hardest hit areas.

Medical Benevolence Foundation (MBF)partners with local church-owned hospitals, clinics, and medical schools to establish a Christian Medical Network operated by and for locals in the counties where they work. SPC has supported work of MBF at Mulanje Hospital in Malawi for many years. Two days after the earthquake, a team from one of MBF's sites, Hôpital Sainte Croix (HSC), gathered supplies and equipment to take to Les Cayes. They were joined by nursing students and spent four days a week on the road operating a mobile clinic for the villages that had no medical care and have since conducted 8 mobile clinics for patients in Les Cayes, Maniche, Jeannette, Beraud, and other areas.

These efforts are just the beginning of a lengthy recovery period for Haiti, where they are also experiencing political upheaval and increased insecurity. Both WORK and MBF remain committed to continuing to meet the needs of Haitians and are well-placed to respond as a result of their long-term investments in building local capacity.

The International Partnership of Pittsburgh Presbytery states the following on its homepage:

"There is no part of the church of Jesus Christ that can be whole and complete without the gifts available to it from the whole church. Only in partnership with each other can the various parts of the church effectively respond to the spiritual, social and physical needs of the people of God.

With this in mind in 1991, Pittsburgh Presbytery and the Synod of Blantyre, Malawi, Africa developed a partnership. Then in 2013, this partnership was expanded to include South Sudan. It has been an opportunity for hundreds of people and dozens of congregations on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean to grow in their faith and learn to serve God patiently, obediently, and passionately."

Thirty years ago, this partnership, which warmly connects like-minded Christians from across the Atlantic, began. To-day, amidst the challenges of a pandemic, the partnership continues through prayer, God's grace, and Zoom. And although travel between the countries did not occur for a second year, there is hope and talk of a trip for 2022.

As for the current situation with our partners, the Synod of Blantyre in Malawi and the South Sudan Presbyterian Evangelical Church, there are several updates.

First, the Zomba Theological College (which belongs to the General Assembly of the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian) is seeking funding for external auditing in order to move towards becoming a University. As a part of attaining accreditation status, it must "conduct and produce audited financial statements." The aim is to become a self-sufficient institution, continuing to train Presbyterian Pastors who will eventually serve both Malawi and congregations abroad.

Next, the South Sudan Presbyterian Evangelical Church is about to hold its 3rd General Assembly. They had hoped to convene every two years, but due to the political situation in the country have not been able to meet since 2013! This year they are inviting delegates from within and outside the country to form a new body of leaders to "achieve the goal of creating a healthy democratic Church which will act as a beacon of integrity, transparency, and change within our nation."

Another area for celebration is the Evangelical School – Pochalla in eastern South Sudan. On April 5th children, ages 4-7, attended open air classes for the first time since 2013. This remote area is determined to build classrooms, support teachers, and equip children to become eventual leaders of their communities. "Our school project started with absolutely nothing except determination and hope. Our philosophy is to take bold action expecting God to do the impossible"

Finally, the Mulanje Mission Hospital of the Blantyre Synod continues to be a source of inspiration. Caring for the most vulnerable in their community, struggling through three severe waves of Covid with high rates of infection and low levels of medical supplies, and dealing with water and sanitation control is all met with unfailing determination. Through these difficult days the hospital continues to seek ways to improve: creatively finding ways to generate more income, planning to build houses to accommodate much needed doctors, and serving young mothers through training programs.

Our wonderful partners appreciate your prayers for these areas of concern and hope. Please keep them in your prayers, just as they continue to pray for us.
