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

How do I get started?

This is such a tricky question. We sometimes ask this in our personal lives. We may say things like "What's the best way to start exercising?" or "I want to pick up a new hobby, but how should I start?" or even - "I'd sure like to clean out the garage, but I don't even know where to begin."

- Sign up on our website to be part of our ministry to the Ladle or the Center for Hope

If you're ready for something more regular, there are lots of other opportunities to deepen your faith.

- Attend one of our Bible studies or groups Bible Basics, Koinonia, Journeymen, the Huddle, this year's Soup Suppers, our Women's Book Study, this year's Lent women's Bible Study, or our Knitting for Mission group.
- Ask Elizabeth about our CCM team and how you can help care for our congregation.
- Ask Erin about our adult education opportunities and how you can be part of them.
- Consider using the talents God has given you to serve one of our committees.
- Volunteer to help with Day on the Lawn

These are just a few of the many ways you can "get started" as you deepen and live out your faith. Sometimes that first step is the most challenging one. The trick is to take it and see where God leads you!





## **DOLLARS & SENSE**

Did you know, *Per Capita* is the amount of support, per member, that our congregation remits to our Presbytery that is then sent onto our Synod and the General Assembly. This money is part of the glue that holds Presbyterians together. It is the money that enables us to work with other Presbyterian churches in our Presbytery and across the country. It is also money that allows us to work with other churches to further the mission of Jesus Christ around the world.

Here is the breakdown of how Per Capita is calculated:

	2022	2023
Presbytery	\$ 23.41	\$ 23.45
Synod	\$ 2.40	\$ 2.40
General Assembly	\$ 8.98	\$ 9.85
Total	\$ 34.79	\$ 35.70

The rate above is then multiplied by the church's active membership number from December 31, 2021. So, for 2023 the rate of \$35.70 x 798 active members or \$28,488.60. For 2022, the amount was \$34.79 x 800 active members or \$27,832.

The Pittsburgh Presbytery offers a 5% discount if we pay this amount in full by January 31 of the current year. We have taken this discount in 2022 (\$1,391.60) and plan to do again in 2023 (\$1,424.43).



## **OUR NEW CONGREGATIONAL CARE MINISTRY**

This is an exciting time in Congregational Care Ministry! After going through training, being interrupted by COVID and other leadership transitions, our team was commissioned last November, and we are ready to hit the ground running in 2023!

As described in our training, our mission is to "care and support one another through the peaks and valleys of our lives." Our role is to: augment the congregational care role of our pastors (who simply do not have enough time to meet the ongoing personal spiritual needs of our 800 person congregation) and to support our brothers and sisters in Christ, as we are all called to do. We stand ready to help care for one another. Our purpose is to ensure our members feel connected, loved, cared and prayed for; and to know that our church is there for them. Our primary role is to be present, listen, pray, and help members navigate the peaks and valleys of life.

Personally, I am so grateful to be part of this ministry. I want to be a part of any effort that helps members know they are cared for and loved by this church. Twenty-seven years ago, my wife Leslie and I lost our 32-day old daughter Sydney. We were new to Sewickley; we knew only Leslie's work colleagues, and we were not yet members of a church. Rev. Jean Henderson was introduced to us by our next-door neighbor, and she became a loving force, not only helping us with the funeral, but walking with us through the difficult months that followed. Jean demonstrated the love of Jesus Christ and the Sewickley Presbyterian Church. She showed us what it looked like to actively care. I feel a very strong call to do the same for others in our church. I know my fellow Congregational Care team members feel likewise.

Our hope is that this ministry will grow with others choosing to go through training and joining the CCM effort, and that Congregational Care will become an integral part of members' experience with our church. We hope it will help our church grow in love and community, and add to the strength and vitality SPC has long been known for.

The Sewickley Presbyterian Church shows up in many, many ways to provide outreach and mission. We are hoping this effort will be yet another way for us to show this same love to the members of our congregation as we actively care for one another.

Nearly 100 people sang the above lyrics from the early 1900s hymn, *Lift Every Voice and Sing*, on Sunday, January 15, at Sewickley United Methodist Church. The Methodist Church graciously hosted an ecumenical worship service in observance of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Day. Our church joined with St. Matthews AME Zion, St. Paul's Lutheran, and Sewickley United Methodist, our "siblings in Christ," as Rev. Hannah Loughman, the Methodist pastor phrased it.

The four pastors of these churches, including our own Rev. Emily Miller and Rev. Ryan Kobert from St. Paul's, wove together prayers, scripture, and the congregational singing of four powerful hymns, in barely an hour. Two gentlemen from St. Matthew's AME Zion beautifully sang "Precious Lord, Take My Hand," accompanied by the gifted pianist from Sewickley Methodist. Piercing words from Dr. King were peppered throughout the service:

"Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that."

"Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere... Whatever affects one directly affects all indirectly."

And words like these, expressing Dr. King's hope:

"...that dark clouds of racial prejudice will soon pass away... and the radiant stars of love and brotherhood will shine over our great nation with all their scintillating beauty."

Rev. William Rankin of St. Matthews AME Zion preached an inspiring, uplifting, and yes, challenging, sermon based on Amos 5 to the folks gathered there, nearly 40 of whom were from Sewickley Presbyterian. Rev. Rankin charged us in today's church to eschew the "tranquilizing drug of gradualism"; to be salt, light, and yeast in the world, as Christ called us to be. Jesus did not do what was safe, political, or popular - but rather what is right. Rev. Rankin challenged us to do the same.

The service closed with those present earnestly singing the civil rights hymn, likely written in 1901, *We Shall Overcome*. Rev. Rankin encouraged us to join hands or elbows with those near us as we sang together. And we did - Presbyterian, Lutheran, Methodist, and AME; white and black; all siblings in Christ, before he closed with the benediction and a charge to go out and do justice.

Thank you to all members of the Justice Ministries team, and especially, to Rev. Emily Miller for spearheading the effort for this inspiring community worship service.



Throughout the year, members of our church family provide meals to those in need in our local communities. Providing meals consists of donating, whether purchased or homemade, the various parts of a meal and helping to serve and clean up.

The most familiar to some might be the Center for Hope where we provide a dinner each month. We also provide five meals a year to The Ladle in Ambridge. Both places need our help providing each meal.

The Ladle is an ecumenical soup kitchen and food pantry housed at St. John's Lutheran Church in Old Economy. SPC has been a supporter of this important local ministry since its inception in 2008, providing financial resources and preparing and serving dinner on four to five Mondays each year. A seated meal is served from 5-6 PM and approximately 12-15 volunteers are needed each time.

## THANK YOU FROM THE UKRAINE

November 2022, Prague

Dear friends of Sewickley,

Diaconia ECCB cooperates with the Ukrainian Center in Nusle, Prague. The center was created on the basis of an association of Ukrainian and Czech volunteers with a backing of non-profit organization Ukrainsko Evropská Perspektiva. The purpose of this center is to provide basic life needs for those who arrive in Prague from wartime Ukraine. In addition to the distribution of food packages, provision of accomodation for Ukrainian families in need, there are educational courses and lessons focused on integration and adaptation there. The courses here are aimed at mothers with children and seniors who had to leave their homes and flee to the Czech Republic from Ukrainian cities bombed by Russian army. Czech language lessons, cyber security courses for children, English courses for children take place here. The center serves as a safe space for friendly meetings, for training, psychological support, consultations, support when looking for a job.

In October 2022 Diaconia donated five Lenovo M10 Plus LTE tablets with 100 GB Internet cards to the center. These tablets will be used by the center in teaching courses. The most touching moment was when, on that occasion, handmade cards by children from the PCUSA church in Sewickley were given to Ukrainian children in the center. The younger children were given handmade dolls and little bags carefully knitted by the Sewickley PCUSA knitting group.

Thank you, everyone in Sewickley PCUSA, for your lovely support.
