As we look farther ahead, we are part way through our Capital Campaign. This year, our church will begin enhancing the hospitality, access, and safety of our facilities. If you haven't had a chance to pledge your contribution to this project, I encourage you to do so. This is our opportunity to shape and strengthen the ministry of our congregation for generations to come. As a congregation, we will roll up our sleeves and do the work of enhancing our facilities and our capacity for ministry.

We also find ourselves in the midst of transitions in our pastoral staff. We've said goodbye to an Rev. Emily Miller after two years of ministry, and we look forward to a new phase of ministry at SPC. There are too many details on that topic to cover here, so look for more information in an article in this Interpretation. In short, we have the chance to roll up our sleeves and get to work as God calls us into new ministries.

There are so many opportunities on the horizon for us this year. We are in the rare situation that our only limits are self-imposed. I encourage you to join in the joy of this ministry. Let's roll up our sleeves and do the work of ministry together.



WHAT HAPPENS NOW?

In times of transition, there is one clear question that we ask: "What happens now?"

Having said goodbye to Rev. Miller, you may be asking that exact question. There are so many pastoral duties in our congregation and it's important for us to keep our pastoral staff resourced to keep up with the pace of our church.

Thankfully, our Personnel Committee had enough notice about the transition to begin planning, and started meeting in October to think through the transition. Personnel has spoken with Pittsburgh Presbytery and with Session and has determined that the right next step is to explore bringing in a Parish Associate. To explain what that means, it may be helpful to review some of the specific terminology relating to Presbyterian pastors.

In our denomination, there are several categories of pastoral relationships for congregations – the one with which we are most familiar is an Installed Pastor. Pastoral positions like that are called by the entire congregation and involve an installation service by the Presbytery as well as a formal Pastor Nominating Committee. This process is familiar to us because it's the process SPC used to call me as the Head Pastor. The process is lengthy, sometimes taking multiple years.

Another category is the Temporary Pastor, which is a year-to-year contract. A temporary pastor is called by

the Session, and is ordained, but not installed. It does not require a formal Pastor Nominating Committee. This is the category of relationship SPC has with Rev. Creamer, our Associate Pastor.

The Parish Associate is a third category. A Parish Associate is an ordained pastor within the Presbytery who develops a relationship with a specific congregation without being formally installed. We have had several Parish Associates over the years – for example, our own Rev. Dr. Stew Lawrence served as Parish Associate here for several years. This category of pastoral relationship requires input from both the Session and the Presbytery.

Our Personnel Committee has recommended this third category to Session. Pittsburgh Presbytery has been part of the conversation with us as we discern the next steps. We plan to begin formal conversations with potential candidates this month.

Transitions tend to be so bittersweet. It's hard to say goodbye to a pastor, yet we look forward to new and exciting possibilities on the horizon. As often happens during transitions, there will be other shifts and additions to our staff as we consider where God is leading us. More information will be available as we move forward, particularly at the congregational meeting on January 26.

They were able to fill FOUR backpacks with the money raised from the lemonade stand.

These stories touch our hearts so deeply because we see Christ's love tangibly lived out in the lives of young children. There is something so beautiful in seeing other people sacrifice of themselves to give to others, especially children.

I'm sure there have been many times as an adult you too have wanted to ask people to donate to a worthy cause for your birthday or Christmas instead of giving you gifts. The Angels and Legends fund at Sewickley Presbyterian Church was designed to do just that. By requesting your family and friends give to the Angels and Legends fund as your birthday or Christmas gift or by giving additional money you may receive throughout the year to this fund, you can ensure your monetary gifts are given to areas you are most passionate about within the church.

This year, through members of our church using the Angels and Legends fund directed toward children's ministries, we have been able to create programs that we haven't seen in years at SPC. Through hanging whiteboards in the Children's Studios, mounting TV's, purchasing kid-friendly rugs to sit on, and installing toddler sized-bookcases we have been able to transform our learning spaces and give children access to Jesus in a way that is meaningful for them.

The long term impact of this seemingly small act of kindness is hard to measure. I've been a part of this church family for only a few years, but I've had the opportunity to talk to so many of you who have been here 20, 30, 50+ years. Adults who were baptized in this church have told me so many stories about growing up here at SPC throughout the years. I hear stories of them as babies from their parents and then get to listen to them re-tell of their own time in Sunday School or in the Children's Choir. These are my favorite conversations. I learn so much through these memories and I've seen what happens when a church dedicates it's entire existence (through many generations) to shining God's light on others. I can't help but think that will be our current children sooner than we know it. Will they remember the cozy rainbow rug, or the bookcase shaped like a tree that was bought with Angels and Legends funds? Honestly, probably not, but I think in 20 or 30 years when we hear the children of our church reminisce on their time here as children and youth, what was given to



them through Angels and Legends will be lingering in the background of each conversation. They might not know exactly what was given that made them feel special here, but they will remember the love they felt at SPC because they had cozy spaces to learn in, they will remember the impact Jesus had on their hearts because their teachers were equipped, and they will surely remember the feeling they had standing in front of their church family at Word Sung singing "He came among us meek and poor."

Of course, as the coordinator for Children's Ministries I tend to direct all of my passion and energy into thinking about them, but the Angels and Legends fund is not designed to only support children and youth. The Angels and Legends fund is designed to go straight into whatever ministry YOU are passionate about. We are incredibly appreciative in Children's Ministry when people direct their Angels and Legends gifts to us, but these gifts could also be directed to education and staff development, youth ministries, congregational care...there are no limits. Whatever God has placed on your heart to bless with your monetary gift, that is where your gift will go when you decide to take advantage of this amazing fund. It could be specific such as, "I want my \$1,125 gift to provide personal Bibles to graduating 3rd graders for three years." Or it could be "I want to provide coffee for the Breakfast Club for a year," or "I want our Youth Hangs to be funded for three months."

If you aren't sure exactly where you want your gift to go within Angels and Legends, but you know you want to bless what we need most at SPC, our staff can help you make that decision, but I challenge you in the days and weeks ahead to also have conversations with the people who have been here for decades. See for yourselves the light that has been passed on through generation to generation. Just like those stories of children giving up their gifts to give to others, I think these stories from people who have lived through our church's history will illuminate just how strong Jesus' light shines in all of us here at SPC and how much it has always shined in everyone who came before us.





Suong, whose hobby was woodworking, presented our church with our current Advent Wreath Stand. Now nearly 50 years later we still enjoy using this stand during our Advent services.

Those of us who were there fondly remember the Nhiem family. They are currently living outside of Houston. Trac and Hang have both graduated from medical school! This "refugee" family fondly remembers our church's generosity.





GIVING TO THE CHURCH IN A CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUST

A charitable remainder trust (CRT) can be a powerful tool for giving to the church while also providing potential financial benefits for the donor. Here's a brief overview of how it works:

- 1. **Setting Up a CRT:** The donor (you) transfers assets, such as cash, securities, or real estate, into an irrevocable trust. The trust then pays you, or other named beneficiaries, a fixed annual income or a percentage of the trust's assets for life or a specified term.
- 2. **Tax Benefits:** When you fund the CRT, you may qualify for a charitable income tax deduction based on the present value of the remainder interest that the charity will receive upon your death or the end of the trust term. Additionally, if you fund the CRT with appreciated assets like stocks or real estate, you can avoid immediate capital gains tax on the sale of those assets.
- 3. **Income Payments:** The CRT pays you (or other beneficiaries) income for life or a specified term. This income can be a fixed amount (annuity trust) or a percentage of the trust assets valued annually (unitrust).
- 4. **Remainder to Charity:** When the trust terminates (upon your death or the end of the trust term), the remaining assets are distributed to the charity or charities you've designated.
- 5. **Benefits to the Church:** By naming your church as the charitable beneficiary of the CRT, you can provide it with a significant future gift while also receiving income during your lifetime.
- 6. **Professional Advice:** Setting up a CRT can be complex, so it's essential to work with a qualified estate planning attorney or financial advisor who can help you understand the implications for your financial situation and charitable goals.

Before proceeding with a CRT, make sure to consult with professionals who can provide personalized advice based on your specific circumstances and goals.





LEADERSHIP TRAINING

In the first session, "How Do I Care for My Congregation," Rev. Louise Rogers handed out a paper with COMPASSIONATE CARE typed down the left side. With grateful thanks for being an SPC deacon -- we are here to serve!












MELT ME, MOLD ME, FILL ME, USE ME


We look forward to God at work in and through this ministry in 2025.

Flowers: Most Sundays a family donates the Sanctuary flower arrangement in memory or in honor of someone and requests the deacons deliver the flowers to members of the congregation mourning the loss of a loved one, celebrating the birth of a child or dealing with or recovering from health issues, etc.

Correspondence: Our deacons send cards to those in need of an uplifting note or a note of congratulations, etc.

Meal Coordination: Take Them a Meal is an easy way to organize meals for friends. Several families received meals for a week or more during a time of recovery from an illness or surgery, etc. in 2024!

Masonic Village: An Afternoon Tea was held on April 23, 2024 as residents, deacons, and church staff members gathered to enjoy lemonade and cookies.

Easter Brunch: The Hospitality Committee asked for help from the Deacons and our Membership Committee with the Easter Brunch after all three worship services.

Blanket Sunday(s): May 5 and May 12 we held Blanket Sunday which is a nationwide event spon-

sored by Church World Service. A donation of \$10 provides a blanket and supplies for homeless individuals and victims of natural disasters. This year we exceeded the goal of 200 Blankets, raising \$2955.

Deacon Picnic and Derek's Installation: On Sunday, May 19, 202 our Deacons and SPC's Hospitality Committee planned and organized the food and activities on this great day.

Backpacks in July: Deacons oversaw this project of gathering new backpacks and school supplies for children at the Center for Hope. Our church supplied 67 Elementary School Backpacks and 40 for Junior and Senior High School students. Our deacons distributed them at Center for Hope on August 1, 2024. And extra \$1000 raised was donated to Center for Hope to be spent on helping "hungry kids snacks."

Christmas Food Baskets: We provided 98 Christmas Food Baskets which consisted of donated food items from our congregation. The Packing Party was on December 13, 2024 in the Robinson Room and Distribution on Saturday December 14, 2024. Local grocer, Safran's, provided perishable items including freshly baked chocolate chip cookies. Church members volunteered to assist at Safran's by delivering food to cars, bringing baskets to recipients' homes, and also by distributing baskets at SPC and the Center for Hope.

Tree of Memories/Longest Night Service: Church members purchase ornaments in memory of a loved one and hang them on the tree in the Chapel during the service. If they were unable to attend the service, deacons placed the ornaments on the tree. The ornaments were then moved to trees in the sanctuary for Christmas Eve.




MANY THANKS


