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

As most of you know, we are back in the Sanctuary and Phase 1 of our Pointing to the Cross Capital Campaign is *almost* completed! It's exciting to see the changes that have taken place in the sanctuary. As we anticipate the final lighting components to arrive and to be set-up, we are also looking forward to continuing the project with Phase 2.

Phase 2 includes a series of much-needed updates, repairs, and enhancements to our gathering spaces, security features, as well as important behind-the-scenes necessities we often take for granted—like the elevator panel, stairs, and walkways.

As we begin Phase 2, we are sharing the projected project list and corresponding costs to give a clear understanding of the financial scope of this phase.
















HYMN FESTIVAL





The SPC fall Women's Retreat, thoughtfully led by Pastor Barb Kennedy, brought together 65 women for a beautiful day of connection, reflection, and renewal. Centered on the message NEV-ER and the song by Tasha Layton, we explored God's Word through three Bible studies with the themes of Never Forgotten (2 Samuel 9), Never Forsaken (Matthew 27:45–54), and Never Abandoned (Exodus 2:1–10).

Through heartfelt conversations around our tables, we shared stories of times we had felt overlooked, forgotten, or alone, and were reminded that no matter what we are going through, God is always with us. His presence, provision, peace, and promises are constant, assuring us that we are never out of His care or beyond His love.

After enjoying a delicious lunch and time for fellowship, we gathered in the Faith House for an afternoon of quiet reflection, moving through various stations that offered very personal and creative ways to connect with God in prayer. Women prayed for their families and each other, created beautiful art out of difficult memories, planted seeds of forgiveness, laid down burdens, wrote psalms, and composed prayerful word poetry. Each station was a meaningful exploration of who we are as women of faith, and the deep, abiding love God has for each of us.

From the beautifully decorated dining room, delicious lunch, thoughtful scriptures and stations, and times for prayer the day renewed our spirits and brought us closer to God and each other. We left reminded that no matter where we find ourselves, we are never forgotten, never forsaken, and never abandoned for our loving God is always with us.































A CALL TO ACTION

Mission work falls under so many different areas in our church. In gratitude to all, we look at the November and December calendar and see Knitting for Mission, Christmas basket preparation and delivery, tree of memory ornaments, project Christmas stocking, and volunteers serving at the Ladle and Center for Hope dinners where they face an increasing challenge of food insecurity due to governmental policies, food inflation and a growing concern over job opportunities in their communities. Additionally, we serve and provide funding to over 35 mission partners that are local, national and global in nature. They span areas of need in food insecurities, shelter, health and mental illness services, family services, Christian education and disaster relief of which many cross over into multiple areas.

We will continue to provide our congregation with a broad array of opportunities to volunteer that best suit your time in life. The impact of your work extends far beyond that single Saturday. The blessing of this sale stretches throughout the entire year, reaching individuals and families we may never meet. Yet they feel the love, dignity, and hope made possible through your dedication. They know the good work SPC is doing in the world.

WHY TIME, TALENT, AND TREASURE MATTER IN THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

In every season of the Christian life, we are invited to consider the gifts God has placed in our hands. Some of these gifts are tangible, like financial resources; others are woven into who we are—our skills, passions, and personalities. And some of the most precious gifts we hold are the hours and days that God entrusts to us. The church has long used the language of time, talent, and treasure to help us think about how we offer these gifts back to God. Each one matters, and each one plays a vital part in shaping not only the life of the church, but also our own spiritual growth.

Time: The Gift We Cannot Replace

Time is the one resource we all receive in equal measure, yet it is often the hardest to give. When we offer our time—showing up for worship, volunteering in ministry, sitting with someone who is grieving, teaching children, preparing meals, or praying for others—we participate in the sacred work of building God's kingdom. The hours we devote to God's purposes shape us into more patient, compassionate, and attentive people. Jesus often modeled this, taking time to be present with those around Him, even when He was tired or interrupted. Giving our time is a way of saying, "Lord, You are worthy of my attention, my presence, and my energy."

Talent: The Gifts God Placed Within Us

Paul reminds the church in 1 Corinthians that the Spirit gives each believer unique gifts "for the common good." Our talents—musical ability, leadership, hospitality, organization, creativity, teaching, craftsmanship, compassion—are not accidental. They are intentional gifts meant to be used in service to God and others. When we share our talents, we help the church become the vibrant, living body of Christ. The choir needs voices; the nursery needs

joyful caregivers; committees need wise thinkers; mission teams need willing hands. No talent is too small or insignificant. In fact, many unseen gifts—quiet encouragement, behind-the-scenes service, steadfast prayer—often have the greatest impact. Offering our talent is an act of gratitude: "God, You made me uniquely—may my gifts bring Him glory."

Treasure: Generosity as a Spiritual Practice

Scripture consistently teaches that generosity is not about the size of the gift but the posture of the heart. When we give financially, we participate in God's abundant work in

the world—feeding the hungry, supporting mission partners, caring for the vulnerable, maintaining the ministry of the church, and strengthening the programs that help faith grow. Giving our treasure reminds us that everything we have comes from God and ultimately belongs to God. It loosens our grip on material things and deepens our trust in God's provision. Generosity becomes not a duty, but a joyful response to God's extravagant love.

A Life of Wholeness and Gratitude

Time, talent, and treasure matter because together they form a complete offering. WWe grow in gratitude, deepen our connection to our church family, and participate in God's transforming work in the world. In giving generously, we discover that God has already given generously to us—abundantly, faithfully, and without end.



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
