Campaign Update

Moving Forward With Phase Two

As I shared a few weeks ago, Phase One and part of Phase Two of our safety, accessibility, and improvement projects have now been completed. Thanks to the dedication of many volunteers, church leaders, and supporters, our church is becoming safer, more accessible, and more welcoming for all. These improvements are helping create spaces that better support worship, fellowship, ministry, and community life for everyone who walks through our doors.

Our goal is to raise approximately \$3 million through the Pointing to the Cross Capital Campaign. To date, we have raised nearly \$2 million, in addition to several designated gifts. This progress is a testament to the faithfulness and generosity of our congregation, and we are deeply grateful for the support we have received so far.

While much has been accomplished, important work remains. Our two primary projects are enhanced church security and upgraded elevator controls, which together will cost approximately \$300,000. These improvements will help ensure that our facilities remain safe, accessible, and welcoming for all who gather here for worship, fellowship, and ministry. In addition, 10% of all funds raised through the campaign will be dedicated to mission work. Our Mission Committee is prayerfully discerning how these resources can be used to make the greatest impact in our community and beyond.

We are deeply grateful to everyone who has contributed to this effort. Because of your generosity, we are investing not only in buildings and infrastructure, but in the future ministry of Sewickley Presbyterian Church. These projects will help us continue to be a place where people encounter God's love, build meaningful relationships, and grow in their faith for years to come.

As we look ahead, we remember the generations before us who faithfully invested in this church and its ministries. Many of the spaces and resources we rely on today began as future-focused dreams supported by those who came before us. Their vision and generosity created opportunities for worship, discipleship, outreach, and community that continue to bless us today.

Now it is our turn to continue that legacy. The improvements we make today are not just for our current needs, but for the generations who will worship, gather, learn, and serve here long after us. Through this campaign, we are preparing our church for the future God is calling us toward.

If you have already given, thank you. If you have not yet had the opportunity, we invite you to prayerfully consider joining us in this important work. Together, we can continue Pointing to the Cross and ensuring that Sewickley Presbyterian Church remains a vibrant place of faith, hope, and ministry for generations to come.

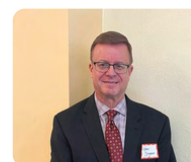

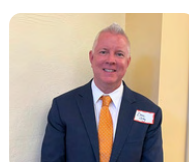

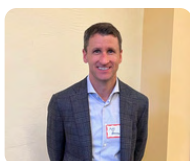

Did You Know?

Like many Presbyterians, you may have wondered, “Exactly what does per capita do?” Per capita is the amount of support, per member, that our congregation remits to our Presbytery that is then sent on to our Synod and the General Assembly. This money is part of the glue that holds Presbyterians together. It is the money that enables us to work with other Presbyterian churches in our Presbytery and across the country. It is also money that allows us to work with other churches to further the mission of Jesus Christ around the world.

Here is the breakdown of how Per Capita is figured:

	2025	2026
Presbytery	\$24.87	\$25.74
Synod	\$ 2.40	\$ 2.40
General Assembly	<u>\$10.84</u>	<u>\$11.86</u>
	\$38.11	\$40.00

The rate above is then multiplied by the church’s active membership number from December 31, 2025. So, for 2026 the rate of \$40.00 x 819 active members or \$32,760.00. For 2025 the amount was \$38.11 x 795 active members or \$30,297.45.

The Pittsburgh Presbytery does offer a Five Percent discount if we pay this amount in full by January 31st of the current year. We have taken this discount in 2025 (\$1,514.88) and did it again in 2026 (\$1,638.00).

Koinonia

This past year, the ladies in the Koinonia Bible study went through two books.

In the fall, we began reading our first book written by Lysa TerKeurst called “Trustworthy: Overcoming our Greatest Struggles to Trust God” a study on 1st and 2nd Kings. There were many lively conversations around the tables as we discussed the kings of the Old Testament - kings like David, Solomon, Rehoboam, Jeroboam, and Ahab (who was married to Queen Zezebel). We learned that in most cases the king we were studying “did more evil in the eyes of the Lord than any of those before him.” However, there were a few kings like Jehoshaphat and Josiah who followed after God and did good for their people.

After finishing this study, we moved to our next book by Gretchen Saffles called “A Well-Watered Woman: Rooted in Truth, Growing in Grace, Flourishing in Faith.” We had discussions about what it means to ABIDE in Christ. The author taught us to Accept pruning, Believe God’s Word, Identify false vines, Delight in Jesus, and Endure hardships with Joy.

At the end of our study year, we had a celebration to commemorate our time together. We gathered in the dining room for food and fellowship with some gifts to remind us to “Live life in full bloom.”

We look forward to gathering again in the fall to see what God has for us to learn next.

Uncovering the Church's Blind Spots

During the COVID-19 pandemic and the racial unrest following George Floyd's killing, Rev. Ralph Lowe and Rev. Brian Wallace recorded six "Awareness and Transformation" conversations that were used as Adult Education classes at SPC in 2021. Five years later, the two Presbyterian pastors returned to Ansby Hall for a three-week series exploring White Cultural Dominance & the Church, Christian Nationalism, and Social Media and Faith Formation.

In the first session, Ralph and Brian discussed white cultural dominance and how white experiences are often treated as the norm while the experiences of people of color are minimized. Both pastors emphasized the value of relationships across racial lines and encouraged learning from voices with different lived experiences. Brian stressed the importance of approaching others with curiosity rather than judgment. The second week focused on Christian nationalism and the relationship between church and state throughout history. Ralph contrasted patriotism—the love of one's country—with Christian nationalism, which elevates national identity and political power above Christian faith. Both pastors pointed to the Presbyterian Confession of 1967, which affirms that Christ alone is Lord. The final session examined social media's impact on faith and community. While social media can raise awareness and mobilize support for important causes, Ralph and Brian cautioned that it can also create echo chambers, diminish meaningful dialogue, and contribute to rising anxiety among young people. They noted that church involvement can provide affirmation and connection that social media often cannot.

The series resonated strongly with the congregation, averaging 50 attendees per week—the highest Adult Education attendance of the year. Through their thoughtful and engaging conversations, Rev. Lowe and Rev. Wallace challenged Sewickley Presbyterian Church to thoughtfully engage these important issues while remembering that our ultimate allegiance belongs not to our country, culture, or technology, but to Jesus Christ.

The Chosen Series

This study was started a few years ago by Rev. Emily Miller, but has been led for the past two years by Erin Leghorn, Director of Discipleship.

Each week, we watched one episode from Season 4 of the show which tells the story of Jesus, His disciples, and the people they meet along the way. After each episode, we had rich discussion about the episode, its themes, how the episode compares to the Bible, and how it all applies to our lives.

We look forward to this study every winter! Look for Season five coming in 2026!

In May, the Evergreens traveled to Shadyside to visit the Rodef Shalom Biblical Botanical Gardens. Despite the rain and cold temperatures, we enjoyed touring this small but interesting gem in the city. Educate, Engage, Activate

Over the last year there has been a lot of important work done by our mission committee. In 2025 we distributed over \$195,000 in funds to 31 different organizations, and we strive to continue giving toward our partner's missions to make maximum impact financially. But in addition to financial support, our big goals over the last year have been to develop stronger relationships with all our mission partners, to understand their needs better, and to foster more relationships between them and the congregation. This has involved having each member of our committee be the point-person for multiple mission partners, getting to know the organizations and their representatives well so that we can connect them here at SPC. Simply put, our purpose has been threefold: **educate, engage, and activate**.

One of our new endeavors in 2026 was to launch our first ever "Month of Mission." The goal was to **educate** both ourselves and our congregation about the work and needs of our partners. So we invited some to come deliver a minute for mission during worship, some to speak at our adult education hour, and others to come give brief presentations during our Lenten Soup Suppers. We created an opportunity not just to learn about their work but to **engage** with our partners and build connections and relationships. Our belief was and is that if our congregation knew our partners better and built personal relationships with them, then we would be able to get more directly involved in the work they're doing.

We're pleased that as a result of these efforts, a relationship was built with our partners at the food bank and some of our members at one of our soup suppers, leading to a group of our church members going to serve for a day with them (see following article). This is why we wanted not only to educate and engage our congregation in mission, but also to **activate**—to invite you all to join in the hands on work alongside our partners.

Rich Garbee, chair of the Mission Committee, reminded us in his minute for mission back in February: *"We know everyone is busy, life is fast and intense. But for a moment, imagine if you didn't know where your next meal was going to come from, or where you were going to sleep, or where you'd get medical help from... The separation of the 'have's, have a little's, and have nothing's' is growing greater by the day. We cannot ignore it. We must help our brothers and sisters. Jesus did not see age or color or where you were born as limitations to his grace, kindness and love."* And Rich left us with Matthew 25 as a reminder of who Jesus has called us to serve.

Our work as a committee continues, and we have plans moving forward to expand on our efforts to develop better relationships with our partners. With Day on the Lawn quickly approaching, there is important work to be done. We hope you'll join us in the commitment to educate ourselves about the needs of our neighbors, to engage with them and know them up close, and to activate our church by joining in the work.



Connecting With Mission Partners

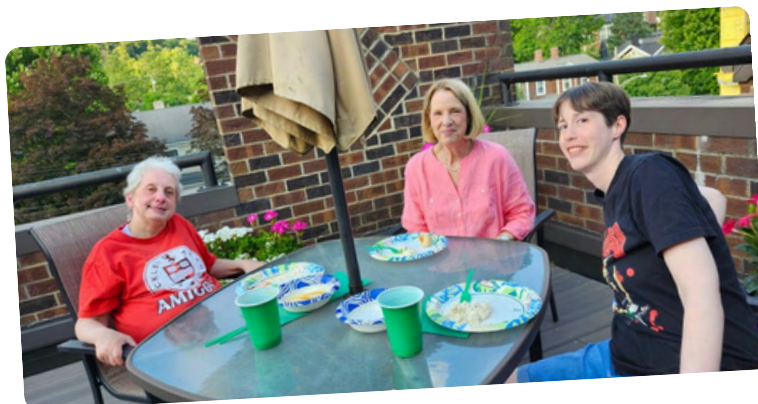
Amigos Ministry

The Amigos Fellowship, a group of adults with developmental challenges, has met at SPC since 1982. The group usually meets twice a month on Friday evenings. Although we always meet at the church, we often go off site for events. We love parties, so we always have parties near Valentine's Day, Easter, Halloween, and Christmas. We also celebrate everyone's birthday at an Unbirthday Party. Other events include duckpin bowling, the high school musical, bingo, miniature golf, a daylong outing to Crestfield Camp and Conference Center and a cookout which we just held on the porch of 316 Beaver St. hosted by one of our Leaders, Susie Cockrell. Other Leaders include Pam and Ron Charles, John Orndorff, Becky Senior and Ann Strong.

Amigos started in 1982 when a group of members interested and involved in disability issues, and parents of young people with developmental disabilities met to discuss how our church might reach out in a meaningful way to this group. The need for social interaction came quickly to the fore, and the planning group decided to try an evening social fellowship twice a month for this special group of young people. Word spread quickly among their networks, and at the first gathering on the church lawn there were seven or eight "Amigos," the name coined by Carolyn Templeton, the Director of Children's Education.

Members have come and gone over the years. We now have ten active members including some original members. We welcome new Amigos who are ambulatory, independent in self-care, able to follow simple directions, medically stable, able to communicate in some manner, and willing to participate. It was a beautiful fall day in 2022 when my family and I arrived in Sewickley Village in search of an outdoor festival, the theme of which I no longer remember. Having recently moved to the Pittsburgh area, we were eager to explore our new home. Being unfamiliar with the village—and with the parking situation as it was—we quickly lost our way. We set out in search of the festival but somehow ended up at Sewickley Presbyterian Church instead.

The SPC campus had been transformed from its usual pastoral beauty. Massive tents covered the grounds, filled with furniture, sporting goods, home goods, jewelry, toys, games, and countless other treasures. There was music, an outdoor café, and volunteers grilling hot dogs and hamburgers. The energy was contagious, and we quickly found ourselves absorbed in the festivities. We browsed the incredible selection of items, enjoyed lunch, and even purchased a new Christmas tree stand after ours failed to survive the move. The price was too good to pass up. It was a thoroughly enjoyable experience.

At the same time, we were searching for a new church home. Based on our experience that day, we decided to visit SPC. Looking back, that decision became one of the most important moments in our lives.

The event we stumbled upon was SPC's Day on the Lawn (DOL)—a massive undertaking that raises tens of thousands of dollars each year for mission partners. Organized and staffed by dedicated volunteers, the event benefits thousands of people locally and around the world. It is not an exaggeration to say that DOL changed our lives, nor is it an exaggeration to suggest that it continues to change lives every year.

Following our DOL adventure, we began attending worship services at SPC. We met many wonderful people and felt warmly welcomed into the community long before we expressed any intention of officially joining the church. That made a profound impression on me—we were welcomed into worship and fellowship whether we joined or not.

There were many reasons we eventually became members. The sermons during worship were powerful and thought-provoking. The charges offered during the benediction challenged us to live out our faith beyond Sunday mornings. The music was exceptional, whether led by the 9 A.M. Praise Team or the choirs during the 11 a.m. service. And there was also the opportunity to give back through DOL.

Case in point: during our first Drop-off Day this year, I watched a new SPC member spend three hours carrying heavy boxes of books, antiques, and household goods from the collection site into the Chapel for storage. It was a tremendous effort, and the many people who will ultimately benefit from that work will never know the person behind it. But we saw you, Chris, and we are grateful.

This year's DOL takes place on September 12 beginning at 9 A.M. Three Drop-off Days remain: July 18, August 15, and September fifth. We still need dozens of volunteers to help with collection days, assist during the week leading up to the event, and serve in various departments on the day itself.

Our family is deeply grateful for the opportunities DOL and SPC have provided. Not only did we find a wonderful church community and deepen our relationship with God, but our son now attends Friendship Preschool and is growing up surrounded by a community of faith filled with God's love. Sometimes grateful doesn't begin to describe how we feel.

Part of this article is an appeal for help, and part of it is an invitation to experience something truly special. Your experience with DOL will be uniquely your own. I cannot say whether it will have the same profound impact on your life that it had on ours, but I am confident it will make a difference. More importantly, I can promise it will make a significant difference in the lives of many deserving people. We are called to serve—and DOL is a wonderful way to do so.

I often think about that beautiful fall day and wonder whether we simply got turned around or were gently nudged toward something amazing. I believe it was the latter. It was—and continues to be—a blessing.
